2,000 Fans See Santa, Mall Fly-In

Special to The Tribune HOLLADAY — More than 2,000 cheering youngsters accompanied by smiling adults were on hand to greet Santa Claus when he arrived at the Cottonwood Mall Friday afternoon.

TO THE DELIGHT of the large crowd, Santa provided a windy arrival for majorities of Murray High School who were gathered on the roof of the mall, as his helicopter settled down for its landing.

The down blast of the helicopter seemed to just about blow the girls off the roof.

ACCOMPANYING Santa was the pretty Snow Princess. His arrival signaled the start of the Christmas Season at the Mall. At dusk more than 3,500 lights were turned on and glowed brightly in the night air.

LONG LINES of children — stretching nearly the length of the mall — were on hand to greet Santa and the Snow Princess and tell them their secret desires for Christmas gifts.

Wayne F. Richards, secretary and manager of the Cottonwood Mall Merchants Assn., said Santa and the Snow Princess will be on hand daily from 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. on Saturdays from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. to visit with his thousands of young friends.

Deadline Today To Pay Taxes

Deadline for paying 1963 Salt Lake County property taxes is noon Saturday, but the county treasurer's office will be open to accept payment until 5 p.m. if necessary.

AFTER SATURDAY property tax payments will not be accepted until Dec. 21, said Treasurer Sid Lambourne. Then delinquent charges will be assessed.

He said that after Dec. 1 a two per cent penalty plus \$1 advertising fee will be assessed against each property.

U.S. Awards \$26,390 for 'Care' Effort

A federal grant of \$26,390 to the Utah Public Welfare Commission for use in day care services has been approved, the commission was notified Friday.

IRVING K. Rasband, director, Utah Welfare Department's Children's Services Division, said it is the second matching grant this year approved by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The funds will be used almost entirely to pay personnel including and coordinating day care center services, and to pay for day care services rendered by the centers to welfare participants.

THE GRANT expires June 30, 1964. Mr. Rasband said a \$17,500 federal grant was approved in early June to be spent before June 30.

He said that grant was used to finance a Community Services Council survey and study of Utah day care needs. The study is scheduled to be completed in January.

Clyde Backs Interior on Water Plan

In a letter to Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall, Gov. George D. Clyde has endorsed for Utah the proposed Pacific Southwest Water Plan.

"I WISH to state," the governor wrote, "that Utah, with full concurrence of its Water and Power Board, endorses in principle the Pacific Southwest Water Plan."

The development proposal came Aug. 26, 1963, from the secretary of interior's office and requires, through provisions of the 1944 Flood Control Act, comment from all states involved.

ESSENTIALLY, the plan embodies coordinated water reclamation projects on the Lower Colorado River financed through a lower basin fund.

Gov. Clyde emphasized in his letter that Utah would oppose any attempt at delaying the Dixie Project in order to have it waiting for the plan's inauguration.

THE GOVERNOR wrote that Utah does favor integrating the Dixie Project—awaiting only approval of the House of Representatives—into the Pacific Southwest Water Plan "as a participant in the development fund and operation of the river."

Among a number of recommendations, Gov. Clyde endorsed authorizing legislation that would:

"SPECIFY . . . Upper Basin states shall never be precluded from developing their water resources nor restricted in time of development within the (Colorado River) Compact apportionment as a result of construction and operation of the facilities under the Pacific Southwest Water Plan."

includes selection of either an architect or a site." Why did the County Commission name the architects under those circumstances?

THE COMMISSION acted within its rights as stated in the opinion from the county attorney's office, said Commissioner Chairman C. W. Brady Jr. "The opinion said we have the authority to act. Commissioner Jensen made a motion to name an architect and we acted on that motion," he said.

COMMISSIONER Jensen said he talked with 26 architects, two of them from out of state, before deciding to recommend one. "I felt like we have waited a long time for a convention center," Commissioner Jensen said. "We feel that we can get things going quicker by naming an architect. The quicker he can make a study of other convention centers, we can save time in the months it will be before we can get a board lined up."

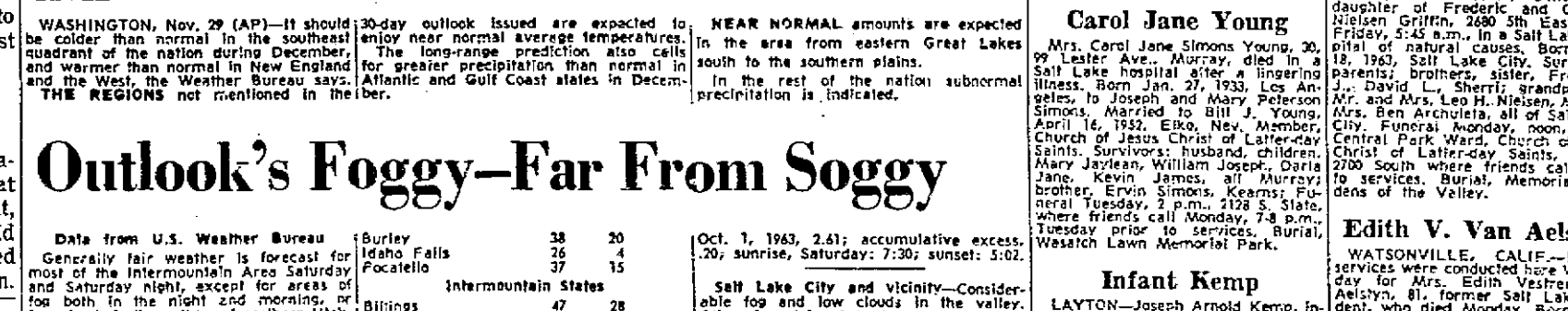
THE ARCHITECTS named, he said, have taken the assignment with the understanding that they will receive nothing for their efforts if the board of directors to be named rescinds the appointment.

THE COUNTY attorney concluded in his opinion that "the proceeds of the bonds cannot be encumbered in any manner which would bind the board. This is the County Commission.
