

PREVENT HEART DAMAGE

Early Diagnosis Needed For Rheumatic Fever

Many doctors feel that a great deal can be done to prevent serious heart damage from rheumatic fever if the cases are seen early and can be kept under control long enough.

A diagnosis of rheumatic fever, however, is not an open-and-shut proposition. It is a physician points out. It is often difficult, requiring careful observation for weeks or even months.

He emphasizes that a child should be given a medical examination if he is in a run-down condition, experiencing some fever and complaining of joint pains.

If the examination and beginning of treatment are postponed until the child has a frank case of rheumatic fever it may be too late to prevent serious damage.

Controlled activity, including bed rest, is the accepted treatment of rheumatic fever, although medication is often used, the physician says.

The physician cautions that sulfu drugs must be given under careful supervision to make sure there are no unfavorable reactions.

Conclusion that a diet high in protein is useful in combating rheumatic fever has been reached by some investigators.
