Dies of Cancer

NORTH TARRYTOWN, N.Y. (UPI) - Ted Mack, who spent most of his adult life offering amateur performers a chance in the spotlight, died Monday at a Westchester County hospital, it was reported today. He was 72. Suffering with cancer, Mack entered Phelps Memorial Hos-pital on Sunday. He died at 4 p. m. Monday, a hospital

p.m. Monday, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Mack, who helped to usher Pat Boone, Beverly Sills and Ann Margret into the footlights from his Original Amateur Hour program on radio and television, never really retired from his talent scouting, his aide Stan Early said today.

After his television program of 22 years ended in 1970, Mack kept up his talent searches on the American college circuit. He was scheduled to host an amateur talent show at the New York State Fair on Labor Day, Early said.

First aired in 1948, "Ted Mack and the Original Amateur Hour" was television's first commercial program. The show, which attracted acts of all kinds from over the country, was presented on each of the three major television networks during its 22-year history.

A native of Greeley, Colo., Mack began his show business career in 1926 with Ben Pollack's Jazz Orchestra. A year later, he became master of ceremonies of vaudeville acts in Los Angeles, but left that to start his own band in 1928.

In 1935 he ended seven years of touring the country and Canada with his band and launched his career as a talent MIDWAY, Wasatch County scout, working as Major Ed-- Tasha J. 




